Increasing visibility and support for children of incarcerated parents









See Us, Support Us (SUSU) raises awareness about and increases support for children of incarcerated parents. Launched in 2015 by the Osborne Association's New York Initiative for Children of Incarcerated Parents (NYCIP), SUSU began as a month-long effort to see and support children of incarcerated parents. SUSU is now a year-round effort with national partners, culminating in a month of action in October. Despite the fact that one in 28 children in the United States experience parental incarceration, many remain unseen. This invisibility isolates and harms children and hinders service providers, educators, and communities from supporting them. Stigma, inaccurate stereotypes, and harmful narratives can further isolate children and families. SUSU aims to decrease stigma, build community, share supportive resources, and celebrate children who thrive and succeed when we SEE and SUPPORT them.

<u>Our Children's Place of Coastal Horizons Center</u> is a statewide program committed to the well-being of these children through advocacy, education, and outreach. Our Children's Place

was honored to be part of See Us, Support Us month. We extend our gratitude to all those who joined us in illuminating this important matter and ensuring that the children of incarcerated parents are both seen and supported. Making An Impact: 13 NC prisons working to make visitation spaces more child-friendly



Our Children's Place, under the guidance of program director Melissa Radcliff, has been instrumental in transforming the visitation experience for children visiting their incarcerated parents. Radcliff's advocacy and education efforts have inspired 13 correctional facilities to redesign their visitation spaces to be more child-friendly. This initiative, supported by a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice's Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, aims to create a less traumatizing environment for children who often have to navigate barbed wire fences and security checks during their visits. The changes include introducing board games, snacks, holiday activities, parenting classes, and more, resulting in more engaged and positive visits. By fostering a family-friendly atmosphere, these prisons are working to support parent-child relationships and minimize the harm associated with parental incarceration. Click here to learn more.

As an advocate for my family and others like ours, I am honored to now add a personal commitment to support the success of OCP so that more children like mine can experience the gift of acknowledgement that this organization provides. We have struggled a great deal learning to navigate our life without my husband home, and it is the hope of "something good coming" that always keeps us moving forward. FRESH - Family Re-Entry Support and Help - UPDATE

We are thrilled to share that Our Children's Place is now in its second year of rolling out the FRESH program at five correctional facilities throughout North Carolina. These facilities include Anson (both men's and women's units), Greene, Johnston, and Lincoln. We currently have the second and third cohorts actively participating in the program. Our dedicated FRESH care managers play a pivotal role by facilitating the "Parenting Inside Out" program, an evidence-based parenting skills training program specially designed for parents involved with the justice system. Additionally, they provide essential individual case management through regular check-ins. Our team is diligently working to establish connections with families to offer re-entry support and coordinate special visits between children and their incarcerated parents.
